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WayneFest: Who the heck is Wayne?

Music has always been a big part of the Coronado Neighborhood. We've got countless musicians and bands living here, and we are home to the Arizona chapter of the American Federation of Musicians. The most visible appreciation for music over the past few years has been the beloved Porch Concert series. While this event has grown in size, it still retains the neighborhood feel that is at the core of what makes Coronado so special.

Sometime after the 2018 Porch Concerts, Mike Logan approached me with an idea. What if we were able to create a larger version of a porch concert and invited all of Phoenix? It's been a standing covenant of the porch concerts that these are designed specifically for our neighborhood as a way for neighbors to connect while supporting some of our resident artists. Mike's idea would allow those outside of Coronado to experience a small part of the magic. In addition, it would create a larger platform for local musicians to build their audience. At the time, I was serving as the President of the Coronado Neighborhood Association and we had been looking for a new fundraising stream to supplement our very successful Home Tours. This type of event seemed to fit the bill, so Mike and I started hashing out the details of what would eventually be called WayneFest.

An event like WayneFest had never been done in a city park located within a neighborhood, so there were some significant challenges to overcome, not the least of which was explaining our concept to city departments, most of whom thought we were nuts.




While we were getting the City to understand our idea, we gathered a small group of dedicated volunteers to aid in the creation of the first WayneFest.

We all brought different skill sets but none of us had hosted a music festival before. What we lacked in experience we more than made up for in passion and determination. We knew we wanted this to be a hyper-locally focused event, which became our measuring stick for what should be included. To that end, we made a conscious decision to partner with local restaurants to showcase their talents at the event.

Once we had the main parts figured out, we had a lengthy discussion about the name. WayneFest? Other than Mike and I, no one really got it until we explained it to them. Coronado has a rich musical history and it was important for us to have the festival recognize and make tribute to that fact. At one time, there was a particularly famous crooner who lived in Coronado. He had just the right amount of kitsch and musicianship to fit the bill. After much deliberation, we decided to keep WayneFest and make it an event that would make people exclaim, "Thank you!" (get it yet?).

The first festival was a solid success during which we learned a great deal about how to run festivals (for example, don't run out of beer). We used these lessons to improve the second WayneFest and were able to recognize a substantial profit, a rarity for a second-year festival.

In keeping with our community ethos, we donated a dollar from each ticket to the music program at North High School and plan to continue this for future WayneFests.

The fest took a year off due to the pandemic, but we are proud to announce that WayneFest will be back on December 4th, 2021! We'll continue our focus on local artists and vendors and think you'll like our new format (and size!). We hope to see you all there and please don't forget to invite ALL of your friends!

FOOOOOD! Does anyone else think about it all day, or is it just me? I feel very fortunate to live in a neighborhood with so many tasty restaurants within walking distance. It's certainly one of the top reasons I love living in Coronado. And while I personally have to walk a bit further to get there now (but good to get those steps in!), The Coronado's new home on 12th St and Oak St beautifully ties together the center of our neighborhood. To learn more about The Coronado, we interviewed Emily Spetrino, one of the co-owners of the restaurant.

Please tell us a little about yourself and how The Coronado came to be.

Myself, my wife Elle Murtagh (who is the head chef) and our partners Liz & Juan Tavarez opened The Coronado in late 2015, so we're actually just celebrating our 6th birthday! The four of us have been friends for years and knew we always wanted to do something together if the opportunity arose. We lucked out with being offered our old location (7th St & Monte Vista) and from there this little restaurant blossomed.

You recently opened a new space in the heart of Coronado—what originally drew you to Coronado?

My wife and I had lived in Coronado up until recently, so we have always had a soft spot for the neighborhood and felt really excited to have lucked out into these two spots. It's really central to where we exist, our kids go to school down the road, Liz & Juan live close by. It's just a great middle ground for all of us and truly one of the most beautiful and eclectic neighborhoods in Phoenix.



What inspires your menu?

Growing up in Arizona inspires the menu for sure. Being able to make the foods we have missed since becoming plant-based was really important for us. So you'll definitely find a lot of Southwest inspired dishes but all of them are vegetable forward. We also curated our wine and cocktail menu to reflect what we wanted to see out of a "vegan" spot. We're hoping someone who has never really eaten plant-based will look at our menus and feel excited to try things, and not be turned off by offering only mock meats or thoughtless drinks.

What else would you like the neighborhood to know about The Coronado?

That we truly love being here. We may not always have the capacity to put ourselves out there, but we love being even further in the neighborhood and feeding everyone our veggies. It's so hard to run a small restaurant but we feel the love often from you all and it's not lost on us, we just appreciate y'all so much.

Thank you, Emily and The Coronado staff, for providing our community with such an enjoyable spot to get delicious food and beverages. If you haven't been, be sure to stop by and try out their unique plates! On My Square

The Greater Coronado Neighborhood is officially bound by Thomas Road to the north, SR-51 to the east, I-10 to the south, and 7th St to the west. A near perfect square. A square where neighbors are constantly buzzing around, eager to help one another with projects, support local businesses, host art crawls, organize scavenger hunts, and more. Our vibrant community is the place to be.

And yet like anywhere, our community has its struggles. Despite being centrally located, our neighborhood is short of many resources, including youth programs for children of low-income families. Enter G-Road, a non-profit focused on youth programming in the 85006 zip code. To learn more about the organization and the support it provides to youth in our community, I met up with Daniel Stanton, Director of G-Road.

While I posed as knowing a fair amount about his organization, it turns out my knowledge only scratched the surface. G-Road's mission is to support young people on the road to adulthood through creative programming and intentional relationships. The term "after school program" undermines the reach his organization seeks to have, as it is fundamentally aimed at community investments, building continuity between the community and leadership, and creating a space for the youth to thrive.

Daniel started G-Road in 2010 as he finished up his undergraduate degree. Having grown up in Coronado (that's him on the right!) and relying on support systems, he recognized the gaps and felt a calling to work to address them. As Daniel described it, "We refer to 85006 as The Square. The Square is made of several communities that are all vibrant, but which could all benefit from consistent and equitable access to better resources.



Our approach is focusing on one centralized area to create an energy and power dynamic shift that is led by the people and focused around their needs. For us, when you look at problems of homelessness, displacement, drug abuse, etc. addressing those problems should really be a preventative approach and start with preparing young people for adulthood. Children and young adults need to be equipped to handle the weight of adulthood to prevent these other issues."

To prepare youth for adulthood, Daniel takes a boots-to-the-ground approach. He loves being on the frontline of running the programs and interacting with the kids. G-Road is framed around understanding and respecting how people are the most valuable asset to a community and works to equip the kids today for a better society tomorrow.

Though Daniel leads G-Road with vigor and ambition, he notes trying to create a power dynamic shift from corporate non-profits to a community-based approach has its challenges. As he explained "It takes commitment and organization and funding and public trust. And building trust has to come from a young age so that's why our focus is on kids. They need all of the lessons and tools to be responsible and productive individuals in the future." To break the mold, G-Road is regularly looking for partnerships with other local organizations.

One active project G-Road is working on is in partnership with the Community Leadership Institute (CLI), a program established by NeighborWorks America and facilitated locally by Trellis.

The CLI program brought several neighborhood residents who worked together to find a way to support an effort or initiative that already exists in the neighborhood. It evolved to support G-Road because of their focus on Coronado and the synergistic opportunities to develop programs the community can contribute and participate in as well. More specifically, G-Road is investing in their community garden and doing beautification projects with local artists to create a positive, safe, and enjoyable outdoor learning area. In this way, the support from CLI was a way to amplify G-Road's voice and rally around things that are important to the community and create a space that reflects those values.

As we wrapped up our coffees, Daniel parted with this positive message "the kids from Coronado have so much ability and we just need to help them get there. I would bet on kids from The Square over any other kids in the Valley. And G-Road, and anyone who wants to support G-Road, will help create a path of least resistance so kids are encouraged to invest in their own ideas and passions."

As a core gathering place in the Coronado Neighborhood and a familiar place to many who commute to the area daily, Emerson School is a cornerstone of Coronado. After a year away because of COVID, it re-opened its doors for students in September 2021, marking both its 100th First Day of School (photo right) and 100 years of educating students in central Phoenix. While the school was relocated in 1981 from its original location on 7th Street to its present-day location on Palm Lane, its legacy as a community school remains. Despite a multitude of challenges - from a changing local economy, the threat of school consolidation, competition with charter schools, closure due to COVID-19, to the tumult of virtual learning, hybrid learning, and re-opening school at the start of this year - Emerson is alive and well. We invite you to be a part of the Centennial Celebration with us this spring!

Emerson School strengthens community ties

Our mission as a community school is to bring our students into the community and bring our community into the school. In 2019, I joined a group of dedicated teachers and staff. Since then, we have worked doggedly to re-establish our school as a place where people come together to connect, share their talents and expertise, and grow as learners and as kind people. We have and continue to tap into the skill and intellectual capital of the people in our neighborhood. As a result, we have graciously been supported by many, including:

Caleb Reed, Executive Director at Aim Right Church, has presented us with backpacks for students and sponsored events to celebrate staff. **Dr. Sarah Coles**, a physician in the Family Medicine Residency at BUMCP, partnered with us to create Emerson's Mini



Med School - an after-school program engaging students and resident physicians in studies of biology, anatomy, and health.

Jens Larson, Director of Phoenix Youth Circus Arts, has raised money repeatedly to support the performing arts and bring his craft to our students. **Miguel Ibarra**, a local artist, worked with our art teacher Ms. Yuen to create a graffiti mural at the Coronado Home Tour in 2020 to demonstrate the kind of hands-on engagement we promote at Emerson. They partnered again in summer 2021 with local artists **Reggie Casillas** and **Gloria Granados** to co-design and paint an additional mural with students. **Maggie Keane**, a renowned muralist, taught students elements of art as they painted a student-focused mural on Emerson's campus last summer. **Darrell Hoerter**, an outdoor designer, led a group of students in a study of desert plants as he and several students transformed an austere alcove into a beautiful courtyard garden on campus. And **Phil Kinsey**, former Emerson principal, brought his big yellow front-loader and worked with Mr. Hoerter to make the desert garden project a success.

Come grow with us

Within the Coronado Neighborhood, the Emerson Community is strong. This year, we are honoring our neighbors' commitment to our school by investing in the next 100 years. Here are some of the activities in progress:

100 Trees for the Next 100 Years

We are working with the Arizona Sustainability Alliance, Trees for Harmony, and other community partners to plant 100 trees on the Emerson campus in spring 2022. This effort is part of our vision to be a HeatReady School and to support the Healthy Urban Environments initiative of ASU's Global Institute of Sustainability and Innovation by planting trees as natural producers of shade and oxygen. With time and nurturing, they will create cooler, healthier air for our students and the community. We are presently seeking 100 volunteers for our spring planting (date TBD) as well as inviting individuals, families, or businesses to sponsor trees.



Healthy Hearts & Healthy Habits Run/Walk (4H Run/Walk)

Get moving! As part of our 100 year celebration, and in looking forward to the next hundred, we invite you to participate in 100 miles - starting soon. Once you sign up, you will run, walk, scoot, skate, board, blade, or bounce and keep track of your mileage with the goal of completing 99 miles in 99 days leading up to the day of the event. On the date of the 4H Run/Walk, you will complete a 1-mile circuit in the Coronado Neighborhood with the finish line in the courtyard of Emerson School.

Coronado Community Garden

As the garden seeks new permanent residence(s), a plot of land on Emerson's south-facing campus has been selected and is being prepared to receive several of the raised plots. The land is being graded, fencing and gates are being installed, and irrigation is being updated. The vision is that community members may access the garden as desired from Granada Avenue and Emerson students may access the garden (under staff supervision) as needed,

OAK STREET REDESIGN

A Road for All Users



As we all know, Oak Street is one of the widest streets in the neighborhood, or at least most of it is. There is of course Oak Street Alley between 14th and 15th Streets where it narrows considerably because it is literally an alley, but for the most part, it's a wide thoroughfare for east-west travel in the neighborhood. Oak Street is an important corridor because it is the only east-west street in our neighborhood with signals for safe bicyclist and pedestrian crossing at both 7th St and 16th St. Anyway, the connectivity is important for residents to access local businesses such as Sunshine Market, The Coronado, Tacos Huichos, Rice Paper, and others. It also connects to the pedestrian bridge over SR-51 and connects to the Grand Canal Trail.

Yet Oak Street only has two stop signs, and the wide roadway and minimal number of houses facing Oak St (especially west of 16th St) make it an ideal corridor for vehicular traffic to speed through the neighborhood. To address this issue, the City of Phoenix has been working with the community since 2016 to advance the Oak Street Redesign Project.

Project Location

The Oak Street bicycle corridor begins at the intersection of Oak Street and Third Street, continues east along Oak Street to SR-51, and utilizes the existing pedestrian bridge to cross SR-51. The corridor then continues north along the east side of SR-51. The corridor follows 20th Place between Oak Street and Sheridan Street, and then utilizes an existing concrete path



between Sheridan Street and Thomas Road (1). The corridor crosses Thomas Road at the 20th Street/Thomas Road intersection, and then continues north along 20th Street to the Grand Canal

Project Improvements

Oak Street Redesign Project, which has actively been under construction since June, will maintain the existing number of travel lanes but make a series of bicycle, pedestrian, and other improvements as well. Already, we've seen the pedestrian crossings updated to meet

ADA accessibility standards, bulb outs added along the corridor, and sidewalks added between 10th St and Dayton, and between 14th St and 15th St along Oak Street Alley. The purpose of the bulb outs is to narrow the roadway and provide additional pedestrian space at key locations such as intersections or midblock. They enhance pedestrian safety by increasing pedestrian visibility, shortening crossing distances, slowing turning vehicles, and visually narrowing the roadway, which slows traffic (2). A study by NACTO (National Association of City Transportation Officials) found bulb outs contribute to a significant reduction in the average number of vehicles that pass a waiting pedestrian before yielding to the pedestrian (3). Yay for pedestrian safety! In addition to bicyclist and pedestrian safety improvements, the project will improve

intersection pavement markings, signage, street lighting, and drainage.

Notably, despite the addition of the sidewalk, Oak Street Alley will remain open to vehicular traffic in both directions in response to feedback from the community. Overall, the project supports our active neighborhood by enhancing connectivity and creating a much safer corridor for all users. As someone who bikes regularly, I am hopeful the continued expansion of the City's bicycle network will encourage more people to get out there and bike.
